

From the Pastor:

**CHURCH AHEAD** –The Good Work God is Doing in Our Church

Philippians is one of my favorite books in the library of spiritual counsel we call the Bible. It is a letter of a beloved spiritual teacher to a community he deeply loves. The church at Philippi is one of the few congregations that isn't a "problem child" to the Apostle Paul. They are faithful and true despite living in a difficult time and facing the challenges that any small community must endure. Still, Paul is confident that like the mustard seed, the church at Philippi will produce abundant fruit. He encourages them with these words, "I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus' Christ...and it will be a harvest of righteousness." (see Philippians 1:3-11)

God is doing good work here at South Congregational Church. We have been a faithful people for over two hundred years, facing challenges and conflicts yet pressing on to the goal of doing God's mission here in Centerville and around the world.

Today, we are facing conflicts that we hadn't imagined a year ago. A pandemic that has changed our daily lives and congregational activities. The challenge of climate change puts the future of humanity in jeopardy. The reality of injustice and protest – and incivility challenges our nation

to seek justice for all and find common ground amid diversity.

In this challenging time in which our circumstances are very different for us as a community, we can still be faithful. On a foggy day last week, I couldn't see the steeple, but I could hear the bells tolling reminding me that even if it isn't always visible, our church is doing good work, God's work, here in Centerville.

Let us, in the days ahead embrace the good work God is doing in our lives and our congregation. Let us pray for our congregation and its mission and then go forth to bring joy to the world and healing to our community in Christ's name.

Mystic Mondays at 1:00 p.m. will be focusing on the mystics of the Bible. We will be reflecting on the mystical origins of our faith by looking at major figures from scripture. One thing is clear, when you encounter the Living God, you not only experience divinity you receive a vocation and a mission. (Group will not meet October 12)

Messy Incarnation: Jesus for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, Wednesdays at noon, will focus on the meaning of Jesus' life, its impact and the insights we can gain from it, both in the first century and our own time.

What would you like to study next? Most of our groups emerge from grassroots suggestions. If you have ideas for themes, let Pastor Bruce know.

### RE-GATHERING FOR IN-PERSON WORSHIP SCHEDULED FOR OCTOBER 11

In coordination with the Building and Grounds Team, the Leadership Circle has scheduled re-gathering for in-person worship, Sunday October 11 at 10:00 a.m., pending continuing progress in responding to COVID-19 on Cape Cod, Initially we will be meeting in the Fellowship Hall. We have been working hard to provide worship services that are safe and welcoming, which will include a deep professionally done sanitizing of the church building in early October as well as sanitizing between each service. We will also have four HEPA filters, purifying the air throughout the service. We are following the guidelines of the State of Massachusetts and Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ.

Worship will be different, initially limited to 30 participants and in the Fellowship Hall, we will have to learn new ways to be a community of faith. Here are some changes that are necessary for safe public worship:

- 1. Everyone must wear masks. (We will provide disposable masks if you need one.)
- 2. Attendees need to make reservations each week by Thursday noon to help us provide safe distancing.

- 3. Seating will be assigned and seats will be approximately six feet apart with the possibility of family units sitting together.
- 4. Attendance will be taken in case we need to do contact tracing.
- 5. We will have beautiful instrumental music but no congregational hymn singing.
- Communion will be provided in packets.
- 7. Offering plates will be placed in the back of the Fellowship Hall.
- 8. At the end of the service, people will be dismissed beginning with the back row. You will be encouraged to proceed to the parking lot for safe socializing.
- 9. Fountains will be turned off to prevent contagion.
- 10. Hand sanitizers will be readily available.

We recognize that this will be challenging for all of us. We realize that many of you will not feel comfortable with public worship until we have a vaccine or safe treatment for COVID 19. We support your decision and will continue to provide the following:

 Sunday Zoom Worship and Weekday Morning Prayer as well as adult classes online.

- 2. Daily meditations provided by Pastor Bruce.
- 3. The possibility of parking lot worship at the 10 a.m. service. (Let us know if you're interested.)
- Regular Music and Meditation programs by Pastor Pam.

We also plan to have a time for children in each service, safe activities for our children, and Fourth Sunday family worship. Activity boxes made specifically for each child will be available for children that attend indoor worship.

In a time of challenge, the author of Lamentations affirmed that "the steadfast love of the LORD never ceases/God's mercies never come to an end/they are new every morning/ great is your faithfulness."

Nearly 225 years ago, a handful of faithful Christians established a congregation in Centerville. They felt urgency of spirit to reach out to the community. They took a leap of faith, not knowing what the future would bring or if the new congregation would survive. A few decades later their successors moved the current sanctuary down from Phinney's Lane to Main

Street, again acting on faith without clear guarantees. At every time of decision, our congregation has had a sense of urgency and acted on faith to expand our mission across the community, Cape, and world.

Today, we need to reclaim this sense of urgency as we continue to grow our mission in the larger community and our ministry to one another. We anticipate a deficit in the year ahead. If these deficits continue, we will need to consider reductions in program and personnel. Recognizing our current situation and trusting God with our future, it is our time to move forward on faith. The pandemic has been challenging to congregations and communities. COVID-19 has changed everything except our commitment to do God's work, nurture one another, and reach out to strangers in Jesus' name. With God's guidance and empowerment, we have done great things in the past few years dynamic adult and children's programs along with inspirational worship, welcoming the LGBTQ community, and establishing a ministry with the homeless community. As we move forward to our 225th year, God calls us to new adventures, which will require significant financial commitments.

God calls us to be companions in ministry in growing our congregation's mission in the year ahead. This will take our time and talent. It will also take our treasure.

In this uncertain time for congregations everywhere, God calls us toward far horizons of discipleship. In that spirit, we invite you to prayerfully consider your pledge for next year. If you are financially able, we invite you to increase your pledge. We also recognize

that for many, simply maintaining your current pledge will be challenge. Your gifts of treasure as well as time and talent will help ensure a positive future for our congregation as we seek to follow God's vision.




Deadline for items in the October STEEPLE Thursday, November 18<sup>th</sup>
